Course Description

This remote/studio class is a co-inquiry; an invitation to be intimate; with body, with interior spaces, and with materials on hand. This course approaches printmaking not as a result or product but as a set of questions in relation to a rigorous drawing practice. We will involve ourselves in examining the possibilities of printmaking through affective and haptic encounters, a focus on conceptual development, as well as experimentation as a working practice. We will engage in methods of notation and documentation, weekly embodied and time-related studies, creative writing, and drawing to research and respond to what we are witnessing. Supplementary readings will draw from a wide range of disciplines; as well consider texts, lectures, and discussions to expand your knowledge of artists and thinking on where the limits of printmaking lie. Students will be expected to attend online art exhibitions, screenings, and relevant cultural events online.

Culture of Care

We will be working together as a community to keep everyone, students, faculty and staff healthy this semester. Course Learning Outcomes

- Students will foster a more embodied cognition of their own artistic/creative practice.
- Students will develop collaborative working practices; exploring ideas of co-subjectivity and printmaking in a multi-sensory way.
- Students will explore printmaking techniques emphasizing conceptual development and craftsmanship in the creation of successful images.
- Students are expected to be self-motivated and prepared to work during and outside class sessions.
- Students *must* expend energy on creating the **most successful image/work possible**. This means work that is visually compelling and well thought out --in terms of basic formal principles and the conceptual premise of the image-- will be considered successful, at least average work. Above average, or exceptional work must go beyond the basic expectations for each project. Technical mastery is also extremely important.
- Innovation/Creativity in approaching one's individual work use of materials in this process and a willingness to experiment in your practice.
- Another aspect of this course is the amount of research each student utilizes in order to
 construct images and develop the conceptual basis of the work. Students should get into
 the habit of using the library, internet, and observing their environment regularly; keeping
 notes, photos and sketches to assist in communicating developmental stages of their
 images.
- Participation and collegiality are significant. Discussion with both the professor and studio peers is noted, as is each student's willingness to participate in critiques and their engagement with the course.

It is your responsibility to purchase the appropriate materials for your work. You may need to purchase additional materials as necessary.

Materials to Purchase

A variety of drawing pencils, pens, markers (your choice)

One or more types of water based drawing/painting media: watercolors, gouache, watercolor pencils and/or ink based drawing media (your choice)

Dedicated unlined journal, notebook, or sketchbook for this class, preferably something you can carry around easily

Paper: you will need to purchase paper for your project(s) based on your preference from a local art store or <u>Takach</u> online has great prices, 877-611-7197

Stonehenge or Coventry Rag (economical options), Somerset, Rives BFK (all quality papers made for printmaking that are archival = acid free)

Bristol (economical and archival option, comes in pads of different sizes)

Other papers - consider different colors (note that it may not be archival)

Printmaking inks, depending on your medium/practice

Required Assignments

Movement/Bodies Print - Project I

Create a score or script that produces movement which produces images or text and results in printed matter. This project should be generally inexpensive, easily replicable, produced in a large or open edition, and take form as an artists' book or zine. Writing assignment- project statement.

Ritual-Making Inquiry - Project II

This is a collaborative assignment that involves four parts. You will work with one or two classmates to fulfill this project. 1. Pair up with a colleague – with each partner doing a walkthrough of the other's work or studio space (virtually). 2. You will meet twice weekly at minimum throughout this project for a virtual exchange of your choosing (build an interdependent relationship), crafting this ritual together. Mutually decide a single question or concept that you would like to explore in your ritual space. 3. Develop a collaborative work that visualizes your inquiry. 4. Be prepared to present & discuss your project together. Writing assignment- project statement.

Beyond Paper "Print" - Project III

Create a "print" on an alternative substrate that may include: fabric, wood, metal, glass, organic, digital, and/or found objects. How can material(s) amplify the content and concept of the work? Can a print be a multi-sensory or sensual experience? Writing assignment- project statement.

Weekly Exercises

Weekly activities may take shape in different forms. Activities will include drawing/sketches/notations, creative writing, or exercises that will spring forth from our discussions, thinking, experimentation, and experiences. They are just as valuable as your project grades & participation.

Extra Credit Opportunity

Response on One Suggested Talk - 5 pts

Respond to an artist talk, panel discussion, or podcast you saw or listened to that was relevant to this course. You should identify at least one point of agreement and one point of disagreement or critique. What are you curious about and why? What companion text would help others understand this work? Is there a script/score/printed matter that you can develop for a more embodied understanding for yourself or another?

Note to the Ambitious

Keep in mind that the required assignments are only the minimum to successfully complete the course. The sky is the limit; you are only bound by your own creativity and ambition...
