Course Description:

Italian 201-202-203 is a three-part intermediate sequence aiming to develop students' four skills (reading, writing, listening, and speaking) up to the B1 proficiency level on the CEFR scale (see detailed targets at the end of syllabus). Italian 200 is taught through a task-based approach. This methodology entails exclusive use of Italian in class and focuses on communicative skills, fostering a highly interactive class in which the language is contextualized and emphasis is placed on meaning as well as forms.

Sequence Objectives:

By the end of the Italian 200 sequence, you will be able to:

TalkAbroad: 4 15-minute conversations: \$7.50/conversation

Format:

This class is conducted in-person. Effective August 14, 2021, the University is requiring everyone, regardless of vaccination status, to wear a mask or other face covering indoors. Students are expected to participate in class to fully benefit from course activities and meet the course's learning objectives. Students should only register for this class if they are able to attend in-person. To protect their fellow students, faculty, and staff, students who feel ill or exhibit possible COVID symptoms should not come to class. When absent, it is the responsibility of the student to inform the instructor in advance (or as close to the class period as possible in the case of an unexpected absence), and to request appropriate make-up work as per policies established in the syllabus. What make-up work is possible, or how assignments or course grading might be modified to accommodate missed work, is the prerogative of the instructor. For chronic absences, the instructor may negotiate an incomplete grade after the 8th week, or recommend the student contact their academic adviser to consider a hardship withdrawal (known as a Registrar Drop).

1. Unit Quizzes (25%):

There will be a vocabulary and grammar quiz at the end of each unit covered. Quizzes will be conducted online on Canvas and will be accessible for any **continuous 1 hour during a 24-hour time period** (quiz dates are indicated in the course calendar). Students will be expected to e-sign an honor pledge that they will not engage in, condone or assist others in any act of academic dishonesty or plagiarism. Any such violations will be reported to Community Standards & Student Conduct and may be subject to further action according to the University's Student Conduct Code.

2. At-home compositions (25%):

An at-home composition will be assigned toward the end of, and related to each unit covered. At-home compositions must be <u>typed</u>, <u>double-spaced</u>, and run through a <u>spell and grammar-check in Italian</u> on a word processor.

- 1) You may use a dictionary, but must highlight new words in a different color and new words cannot account for more than 5% of your composition (ex. 10 words in a 200-word composition). If you do not highlight new words or if new words exceed 5% of your composition, your composition will be considered unratable.
- 2) You must only rely on <u>grammatical and syntactic structures that you have learned and that have been covered in your classes until that point</u>, otherwise your composition will be considered <u>unratable</u>.
- 3) Receiving <u>assistance from another person or using an online translation tool</u> (such as Google Translate) is <u>absolutely prohibited</u> and constitutes academic misconduct. These tools are immediately recognizable by your instructor, who is familiar with your level and the structures you are able and expected to produce independently.

Any unoriginal or unratable work submitted will receive a partial or full **zero** and may be reported according to the **University Student Conduct Code**.

Re-writes for the first two compositions (for 10 out of 50 points) must address both <u>language and content</u>. The final composition is one draft only (out of 40 points). The correction key and grading rubric are included in this syllabus.

3. Final exam (10%):

The final exam is comprehensive, and may thus include any and all vocabulary, grammar and cultural material covered **throughout the entire quarter**. The final exam will be conducted online on Canvas and will be accessible for any **continuous 2 hours during a 48-hour time period** on Saturday, December 12. You will be expected to e-sign an honor pledge that you will not engage in, condone or assist others in any act of academic dishonesty or plagiarism. Any such violations will be reported to <u>Community Standards & Student Conduct</u> and may be subject to further action according to the <u>University's Student Conduct Code</u>.

4. Supersite Homework (10%):

Online homework is assigned and to be completed on a regular basis through the Supersite. If students experience any difficulties using the online platform, they must notify their instructor immediately and include a screenshot of the problem they are experiencing. All assignments must be completed by the indicated deadline, and the final grade is calculated on both timely completion and accuracy.

5. Other Homework (5%)

Students are expected to study and keep up with the material regularly outside of class. Besides completing computer-graded exercises on the Supersite, students will periodically receive instructor-graded assignments to be turned in on Canvas on specific dates. These assignments are graded as follows:

6. <u>TalkAbroad</u> (15%):

<u>TalkAbroad</u> is an online platform that allows students to have audio/visual conversations with native speakers of Italian living outside the United States. Throughout the quarter, you will be required to purchase and schedule <u>four 15-minute conversations</u> with any available Italian-speaking partner of your choice. You can pre-purchase additional conversations to use in subsequent quarters for a reduced price. Each conversation will include either a pre- or post-conversation assignment you will turn in to your instructor on Canvas. Deadlines are indicated in the course calendar, and conversations must be scheduled <u>at least 36 hours in advance</u>. Do not wait until the last minute! A detailed Student Instruction Manual can be found <u>here</u>. For any other issues or questions, contact the <u>TalkAbroad</u> support team through the orange chat bubble.

7. Participation (10%):

Learning a language is a highly involved and interactive process. Regular attendance and active participation are essential for performing well and making steady progress. While students are only <u>required to attend</u> the first two days of class in order to maintain registration, attendance will continue to be recorded <u>daily on Canvas</u>. The participation grade is calculated using a daily points system where each day of class is worth 2 points awarded for active participation (94 points total in Autumn 2021). Depending on the day's activities, active participation may include – but is not limited to – any and all of the following:

- Being on time for class and ready to start;
- Having your textbook and any other required materials for the day;
- Using approved electronic devices (laptops or tablets) appropriately and for class purposes only;
- Completing all homework assignments on time;
- Volunteering frequently during in-class activities;
- Fully engaging in any group or individual work as directed by instructor;
- Using Italian at all times and to the <u>best</u> of your ability;
- Adhering to the University's policies on COVID-19 prevention, including wearing approved face coverings indoors at all times;
- Showing and maintaining a positive, respectful attitude toward your classmates, instructor and yourself.

When absent, it is the responsibility of the student to inform the instructor in advance (or as close to the class period as possible in the case of an unexpected absence). Whether or not the absence is excused, and if or what make-up work is possible is the prerogative of the instructor.

Any use of racist, sexist, homophobic, transphobic, xenophobic, classist, or generally offensive language in class or submission of such material will not be tolerated

Anyone who wishes to contest a grade on a particular assignment or exam must consult his/her instructor within 7 days after the assignment was returned to them

Minor in Italian Language and Culture

A minimum of thirty one (31) credits of coursework (or equivalent) are required for the minor in Italian Language & Culture. A minimum grade of 2.0 is required in order for a course to be applied to the minor.

Courses

- 15 credits from ITAL 201, 202, and 203
- 5 credits from ITAL 301
- 5 credits from ITAL 351, 352, 353, 354, 355, 356, or 357, which must be taken concurrently with the ITAL 380 (1 credit)
- 5 credits of electives (see adviser for approved electives)
- Minimum 2.00 cumulative GPA for courses applied to the minor
- Maximum 10 credits of approved study-abroad coursework may be petitioned to apply to the minor

Please note:

- ITAL 201, 202, 203, and 301 must be taken in sequence.
- When Italian Language & Culture minors register for an ITAL 350 level course they must also register for ITAL 380 Italian Culture Seminar to receive the necessary credit towards the minor. ITAL 380 is a discussion course taught in Italian that meets for one hour per week. The prerequisite for ITAL 380 is ITAL 203.
- Students can declare a minor with the adviser in their major department.

Thank you for your interest in auditing a course in the Department of French and Italian Studies. Please be advised that we cannot guarantee a place for ACCESS students or other auditors in any of our classes. This will depend on the type and level of course, the space available, the overall enrollment, and ultimately remains at the discretion of the instructor. Additionally, ACCESS students may not audit courses taught by our graduate or part-time instructors.

Per University policy: "ACCESS students attend classes on an audit basis as a non-matriculated student.
